The Community Drug and Alcohol Task Force Survey is a part of an ongoing process that provides needed information to school officials, parents, and students about the prevalence and patterns of tobacco, alcohol and other drug use by students in our community.



2007 DRUG AND ALCOHOL SURVEY

3,183 students and
2,557 parents of children
were surveyed in Grades 6-12
using a custom questionnaire designed
by *Pride Surveys* to compile data
regarding drug and alcohol use
by our student population.

Student Self-Reporting vs.
Parent Perception



"Teenagers who smoke are 5 times more likely to drink and 13 times more likely to use marijuana than those who do not smoke."

2007 DRUG AND ALCOHOL SURVEY SIGNIFICANT FINDINGS

On average students who report the use of alcohol begin in middle school at 13.6 years of age, and students who report the use of marijuana begin at 14.1 years of age.



2007 DRUG AND ALCOHOL SURVEY SIGNIFICANT FINDINGS

926 (29%) of 3,150 students in grades 6-12 reported the use of <u>alcohol</u> in the last year.

356 (11%) of 3,152 students in grades 6-12 reported the use of <u>illicit drugs</u> in the last year.


Student Perception

74% of 9-12th grade students perceive that their parents feel that it is wrong or very wrong for them to use alcohol




Prevalence of Cigarette Use






Prevalence of Beer Use






Prevalence of Liquor Use





Prevalence of Marijuana Use








How Easy Is It To Get Marijuana

2007 DRUG AND ALCOHOL SURVEY SIGNIFICANT FINDINGS

259 (16%) of 1657 high school students say their friends **frequently** use marijuana with 44 (12%) of 381 seniors admitting they **often** smoked marijuana in the past year.






Students' Friends Who Use Alcohol





Students' Friends Who Use Marijuana






2007 DRUG AND ALCOHOL SURVEY SIGNIFICANT FINDINGS

45 (2.7%) of 1654 high school students have **frequently** been in a car with a teenage driver who had used alcohol or drugs, and an additional 199 (12%) have **sometimes** been in a car with a teenage driver who had used alcohol or drugs

70 (23%) senior parents claim they **don't know** if their child has been in a car with a teenage driver who had used alcohol or drugs.




Students in a Car with a Teenage Driver Who Had Used Alcohol or Drugs






When Students Use Any Alcohol





When Students Use Any Illicit Drugs






2007 DRUG AND ALCOHOL SURVEY SIGNIFICANT FINDINGS

618 (37%) of 1690 high school students usually use <u>alcohol</u> at a **friend's house** with 200 (12%) responding that they use alcohol **at home**.

206 (12%) of 1690 high school students use illicit drugs at a **friend's house** with 90 (5%) responding that they use illicit drugs **at home.**




Where Students Use Any Alcohol
